Planting and transplanting, seeding and reshaping landscaping practices that emerged in the eighteenth century are inextricable from the contested terrain of empire within which they operated. From the plantations of the nabobs to the island gardens of narrative fiction, from William Beckford's estate at Fonthill to Marie Antoinette's ornamented farm, *Sowing Empire* considers imperial relandscaping its patriarchal organization, heterosexual reproduction, and slavery and how it contributed to the construction of imperial power.
